Criminal Justice Sciences Accelerated Sequence: High achieving students with a cumulative GPA of 3.20 or higher may request the accelerated sequence in the spring of their junior year. This sequence allows students to take up to 12 hours of approved graduate courses that will count for both the undergraduate and graduate program in criminal justice sciences. Students can then apply to the graduate program in the spring semester of their senior year. Enrollment in the Accelerated Sequence does not guarantee final admission into the criminal justice sciences graduate program. To graduate in the accelerated sequence, students must take two courses for graduate credit each semester during their senior year. Students must consult with their advisor prior to the start of each course to receive approval. All Graduate School admission deadlines and policies apply to courses for graduate credit.

9 hours must be taken for graduate credit. The student should consult with an advisor prior to the start of each graduate course to receive approval.

A minimum of 3 hours must be taken at the 400-level from the following CJS courses: 402, 403, 421, 467, 470, or 490.

The remaining 6 hours may be taken from the above list of 400-level courses or from any 300-level CJS course not already taken for the major.

#### 3. Provide a description for the proposed program.

The Accelerated Criminal Justice Sciences Sequence is a pathway into the Master's Program in Criminal Justice Sciences. Accelerated degree programs offer high-achieving students the opportunity to complete their bachelor's degree and master's degree with one additional year of study. Students accepted into the sequence will be allowed to take courses during their senior year that will count towards both the undergraduate and graduate programs in criminal justice sciences. Qualifying students must apply to the program in the Spring semester of their junior year. Their applications will be considered jointly with graduate student applications. If accepted, the Accelerated Criminal Justice Sciences student will take up to 12 hours of graduate-level credits during their senior year. Students must then apply formally to the Graduate School in the spring of their senior year. Accelerated Criminal Justice Sciences students taking graduate courses must follow all policies and guidelines set forth in the Graduate Catalog pertaining to their performance and progress toward the degree.

# 4. Provide a rationale of proposed program.

Accelerated master's degree programs offer high achieving students the opportunity to complete their bachelor's degree and master's degree with one additional year of study. Students will take both graduate and undergraduate classes during their senior year and seemlessly transition into the master's degree program for one additional year. These programs allow for an efficient move through two degrees and the ability to jump-start student professional development by completing two degrees in less time than it would to complete them separately. It also allows our program to retain high achieving students through both degrees. A separate sequence must be created in order to track students and which graduate courses can substitute for undergraduate courses. No changes are being made to the original undergraduate sequence beyond course substitutions.

We do not expect the proposed program to have any effect on existing campus programs.
