The Minor in African-American Studies provides an interdisciplinary approach to exploring facets of Black culture within the United States. This program is designed to be of interest to students who want to explore the many contributions of African Americans to the political, historical, social and artistic fabric of the United States. Students are required to take a core of three courses on African-American history and literature, as well as elective courses in the social sciences (History, Sociology, and Politics and Government) and in the humanities and fine arts (English, Music, and Theater).

--24 hours required --Required core (9 hrs): ENG 165; HIS 257, 258 --Choose 3 courses (9 hours) from group A and 2 courses (6 hours) from group B.

Group A (9 hours) HIS 111 OR SOC 111 POL 140, 334 SOC 264

Group B (6 hours) ENG 265, 365 IDS 203.05 MUS 153, 154 THE 154

Other courses approved by the minor advisor may be counted toward the minor.

Rationale for proposal: African-American studies is a well-established interdisciplinary field that brings together scholarship from a number of traditional disciplines in the social sciences, the humanities and the arts. Current faculty expertise and a growing number of relevant courses allow the establishment of a minor that will encourage students to pursue structured study in the field. The current proposal results from the work of a committee of faculty that met in fall 2002 under a charge from the College of Arts and Sciences Council.

If for Teacher Education, include reference to CTE Conceptual Framework: This program is not designed for Teacher Education or certification.

Expected impact of proposal on existing campus programs: There may be small changes in enrollment in some of the courses included in the minor. Attached letters from chairs indicate their willingness to accommodate minors.

Expected curricular changes including new courses: All courses included in the program are currently offered on a regular basis. No

new courses are required.
